

BE STUDIOUS, AS IGNORANCE IS EXPENSIVE

I recently spoke for a worship service for a church in Katv.

Without planning to say it, out came the words, "Ignorance is expensive!"

The phrase became a theme of the message, and I found myself repeating it throughout my delivery.

As an example, I observed how expensive ignorance is to teens who rebel against their families.

Their not knowing the realities of the real world and ignorantly partying on can cost them good reputations, close relationships with quality people, high school and college educations, good jobs and fulfilling careers.

How much might they pay throughout their adult lives for unwise teen choices?

Ignorance can be very expensive!

The word ignorance originated from Latin words that meant "to not know."

Synonyms make the meaning of ignorant more obvious: untaught, unlearned, untutored, uninstructed, unenlightened and uninformed.

An ignoramus is one who is taken advantage of be-

cause he or she has not sufficiently educated himself or herself or been taught the knowledge it takes to ward off preying financially opportunistic predators. He or she has the capacity to know, but doesn't know at the time he or she needs the information.

I once visited with Bill Murray, the son of Madalyn Murray O'Hare, the well-known American aetheist, and he told me something I have always remembered.

He said that although many people are appalled by aetheists, ignoring God (willfully living a life of ignorance about God) ultimately turns out at the same place as aetheism.

He said that if a person is without God, he or she is the same condition without regard to the path he or she took to arrive in that condition.

Readers, think about how expensive ignorance is in Bill Murray's context.

"Ignorance is no excuse," as the saying goes, and that's a reason why the Apostle Paul mentored a young minister named Timothy with these words:

"Study to show thyself approved unto God, a work-

man that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth" (II Timothy 2:15).

What applies spiritually also applies practically.

As a consumer, ignorance has at times cost me. But in a recent transaction, experience saved me from being "hijacked."

I ordered a couple of lightweight items from a national parts warehouse.

The phone clerk totaled my order and said, "And that will be plus 18 dollars shipping and handling (Parcel post, would you believe?)."

Fortunately, I wasn't ignorant of shipping charges, and I replied, "That seems way too much, and it's persuading me to back out of ordering."

Without hesitating, he said, "OK sir. What if I divide that in half, and only charge you nine dollars for S and H?"

I responded, "Then, let's continue with the order."


Had I not known that mail-order companies increase their profits by overcharging for shipping and handling, he could have happily taken advantage of me for his company.

An insider attitude of some companies seems to be: Go ahead and overcharge for shipping and handling. We will lower it for those who aren't ignorant and timid, and we'll make money off those who are ignorant and timid.

"Let the buyer beware" certainly applies today. "Be an informed and defensive consumer" applies as well.

WHAT IS THE WORD THAT JESUS PREACHED?

Where did it come from?
What is its purpose?
The scriptures give us answers to all of these questions.

"Now the parable is this: The seed is the word of God" (Luke 8:11).

"For as the rain cometh down, and the snow from heaven, and returneth not thither, but watereth the earth, and maketh it bring forth and bud, that it may give seed to the sower, and bread to the eater: So shall my word be that goeth forth out of my mouth: it shall not return unto me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it" (Isaiah 55:10-11).

"Believest thou not that I am in the Father, and the Father in me? the words that I speak unto you I speak not of myself:; but the Father that dwelleth in me, he doeth the works" (John 14:10).

"For I have given unto them the words which thou gavest me; and they have received them, and have known surely that I came out from thee, and they have believed that thou didst send me" (John 17:8).

Great boldness is needed to preach God's word. In many instances, people feel threatened when His word is courageously spoken. Something more is needed if souls are to be awakened to a sense of sin in their lives and to be healed by God's mighty grace. When His word is proclaimed, signs and wonders can be done, but we must have belief and faith in God! That is why we read in Acts

4:29-30, "And now, Lord, behold their threatenings: and grant unto thy servants, that with all boldness they may speak thy word, By stretching forth thine hand to heal; and that signs and wonders may be done by the name of thy child Jesus".

However, boldness and faithfulness alone will not bring souls to Christ. We must always remember that it is the Spirit that quickeneth, along with the testimony of preaching the Word. God gives the increase! We only plant the seed! On the other hand, doubt and fearfulness will only hinder the miraculous healing power of God's Holy Spirit.

The convicting word may be very bitter to some of the souls at first, but thereafter it becomes sweeter than honey. To feel the sweetness of this divine security and pace within one's heart, one must keep reading the Word and act accordingly.

God's word is described in the scriptures:

- 1. As the "engrafted word," which is to be received. It is also able to save our souls. "Wherefore lay apart all filthiness and superfluity of naughtiness, and receive with meekness the engrafted word, which is able to save your souls" (James 1:21).
- 2. As the "faithful word," which has been taught us. It is sound doctrine. "Holding fast the faithful word as he hath been taught, that he may be able by sound doctrine both to exhort and to convince the gainsayers" (Titus 1:9). It is given to us for doctrine, for reproof, for correction ad for instruction in righteousness. "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness" (II Timothy 3:16). Through patience and comfort of the scriptures, we can have hope. "For whatsoever things were written aforetime were written for our learning, that we through patience and comfort of the scriptures might have hope" (Romans 15:4).
- 3. As the "word of life," which is to be held forth, that we may rejoice in the day of Christ. "Holding forth the word of life; that I may rejoice in the day of Christ, that I have not run in vain, neither labored in vain" (Philippians 2:16). In John 6:63, Jesus said, "It is the spirit that quickeneth; the flesh profiteth nothing: the words that I speak unto you, they are spirit, and they are life."
- 4. As the "word of truth," which is to show ourselves to be approved of God. "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be

- ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth" (II Timothy 2:15). "Take heed unto thyself, and unto the doctrine; continue in them: for in doing this thou shalt both save thyself, and them that hear thee" (I Timothy 4:16).
- 5. As "the armour of God," "Put on the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places" (Ephesians 6:11-12). It gives us hope unto salvation. "But let us, who are of the day, be sober, putting on the breastplate of faith and love; and for an helmet, the hope of salvation" (I Thessalonians 5:8).
- 6. As "the sword of the Spirit" which is sharper than any two-edged sword. "For the word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing even to the dividing asunder of soul and spirit, and of the joints and marrow, and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart" (Hebrews 4:12). This is why some people feel threatened when God's word is spoken to them. Their own conscience convicts them of wrongdoing, and they feel uneasy about it. Many people in the world today cannot stand to have the truth spoken to them. They prefer fables instead. "And they shall turn away their ears from the truth, and shall be turned unto fables" (II Timothy 4:4).
- 7. As "the door" "I am the door: by me if any man enter in, he shall be saved, and shall go in and out, and find pasture" (John 10:9). Here we get to understand that the Word was made flesh. He was with God and appeared in the likeness of sinful flesh. Christ as only the Word could not be seen or heard in the same way as the word made flesh.

The Word alone has not the virtue in it to relieve the burden of sin for mankind and save our souls. Only through God's grace was it made possible! "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life" (John 3:16).

With Jesus's words, "I am the door", we see:

a. Simplicity - "Jesus said unto her, I am the resurrection, and the life: he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live" (John 11:25).

"By Me"

"I am the door: by me if any man enter in, he shall be saved, and shall go in and out, and find pasture" (John

10:9).

b. Exclusion - "If a man abide not in me, he is cast forth as a branch, and is withered; and men gather them, and cast them into the fire, and they are burned" (John 15:6).

"If any man"

c. Inclusion - "Strive to enter in at the strait gate: for many, I say unto you, will seek to enter in, and shall not be able" (Luke 13:24).

"Enter In"

d. Condition - "And he said unto him, Why callest thou me good? there is none good but one, that is, God: but if thou wilt enter into life, keep the commandments" (Matthew 19:17).

"Shall be saved"

e. Certainty - "Verily, verily, I say unto you, If a man keep my saying, he shall never see death" (John 8:51).

"Go in and out"

f. Liberty - "Now the Lord is that Spirit: and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty" (II Corinthians 3:17).

"Find pasture"

g. Provision - "I will feed my flock, and I will cause them to lie down, saith the Lord God" (Ezekiel 34:15).

"And ye my flock, the flock of my pasture, are men, and I am your God, saith the Lord God" (Ezekeil 34;31).

"Know ye that the Lord he is God: it is he that hath made us, and not we ourselves; we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture" (Psalm 100:3).

God's word pricks like fire and burns like the sun's rays, the same as when a magnifying glass is held to concentrate the sun's rays. The sun's rays burning power is intensified. In like manner, the word of God is both a fire and a burning glass. A divine truth is concentrated through the burning or magnifying glass and focused on the heart of men. It becomes powerful in its influence. It is quick and powerful, piercing, dividing the soul and spirit (Hebrews 4:12). It acts as a discerner of the thought and intents of the heart. That is why people feel uneasy or uncomfortable when God's word is spoken. Their own conscience convicts them of the wrong doings. It is difficult and even hurts at times to have to accept correction, to be told to change. But the truth has to be listened to, convicting us, to make a change for the better, to love more in accordance to God's word. It was the Apostle Paul's charge to Timothy to preach the word, the truth, and to prove, rebuke and exhort with great patience and careful instructions. Today, we must do likewise because we live in a time when many people turn away from the truth and prefer to listen to fables. They would rather listen to smooth talk which does not prick their conscience.

Echinacea, a well known medical plant, has been extolled lately even by the medical profession as a very powerful antidote against flues and colds of any kind and a help in strengthening the immune system of the body.

In like manner, the word of God must be the believer's Echinacea. While in the wilderness of their world, we must always carry it with us in our hearts and minds. It is God Almighty's weapon or antidote to overcome the fevers of passion and anxiety, and the hindrances of doubt and unbelief. It is the only antidote that gives us assurance of safety and peace wherever we are, whether in the midst of a large city with all its rush or in the solitude of a tropical jungle or in the heat and empty space of the desert.

"But he answered and said, It is written, man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God" (Matthew 4:4).

CHRIST GIVES CAUSE TO REJOICE



A STUDY LESSON



Please read Philippians 4:4-13.

"But my God shall supply all your need according to his riches in glory by Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:19).

Philippians 4:4 reads, "Rejoice in the Lord alway: and again I say, Rejoice." The thought is that the child of God has reason to be continually happy. This happiness is spiritual and can be found only in the Lord. The apostle repeats the exhortation to show not only his earnestness but also that it was God's will that this attitude, stemming from a proper condition of heart, would reflect a desirable relationship between the Heavenly Father and His spirit-begotten sons.

We read in Philippians 4:5, "Let your moderation be known unto all men. The Lord is at hand." In this instance, the word moderation means patience. It carries the thought of meekness under provocation, readiness to forgive injuries. The thought of being meek under provocation implies a complete and unreserved consecration to the Lord. It also shows the willingness on the part of the individual to trust in the precedences of the Lord. The Apostle Peter said of our Lord, "Who, when he was reviled, reviled not again; when he suffered, he threatened not; but committed himself to him that judgeth righteously" (I Peter 2:23). This seems to be the thought that the apostle is making. In the latter part of Philippians 4:5, the text reads, "... The Lord is at hand." This is similar to the phrase used in I Corinthians 16:22, Maranatha, which means "the Lord is judge." The complete thought of the text is that the child of God should be meek under provocation, realizing that the Lord is the judge.

In Philippians 4:6, the apostle sates, "Be careful for

nothing; but in every thing by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God." The expression "be careful for nothing" has the thought, be not anxiously solicious. To be anxious would indicate a lack of confidence in the overruling providences of the Lord. In communicating with the Lord by prayer and supplication, we are making a solemn application to God, appealing to Him from a sense of want. The thought of supplication is that of continuance in earnest prayer. Our prayers to the heavenly Father, however, must be prefaced with an earnest desire to ask only those things that are in harmony with His will. If the petition being made is not in harmony, we must earnestly desire that it not be acted upon.

With a full awareness that we as children of God have been blessed above all people and that we have been the recipients of countless past blessings and favors, surely our disposition in all our communciation with the Heavenly Father should be one of thankfulness.

Philippians 4:7 reads, "And the peace of God which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." The real peace of mind comes to the child of God because of his relationship to the Heavenly Father. This peace gives reason and direction to all the conflicting thoughts and appetites that come into our minds because of the flesh. It has as its foundation a sense of pardon and forgiveness, but more than anything else, a realization of favor with God.

This peace will keep our hearts and minds. Our hearts are pictured in the Bible as that of affections, motives, and our minds are symbols of understanding, judgement,

and conscience. These two symbols together represent the new creature, or creation, that is the subject of all God's dealing with true children of God.

This is really saying that if we, as new creatures, maintain our relationship with God and maintain the peace that results from this relationship, then God through the power of the Holy Spirit operating through our Lord Jesus, will keep us from falling.

We truly have cause to rejoice.

A NEAT STORY



Children of single parents suffer more psychiatric woes, study says

Children growing up in single-parent families are twice as likely as their counterparts to develop serious psychiatric illnesses and addictions later in life, according to an important new study.

Researchers have for years debated whether children from broken homes bounce back or whether they are more likely than kids whose parents stay together to develop serious emotional problems.

Experts say the latest study, published this week in The Lancet medical journal, is important because of its unprecedented scale and follow-up - it tracked about 1 million children for a decade into their mid-20s.

The question of why and how those children end up with such problems remains unanswered. The study suggests that financial hardship may play a role, but other experts say the research also supports the view that quality of parenting could be a factor.

The study used the Swedish national registries, which cover almost the entire population and contain extensive socioeconomic and health information. Children were considered to be living in a single-parent household if they were living with the same single adult in both the 1985 and 1990 housing census. That could have been the result of divorce, separation, death of a parent, out of wedlock birth or guardianship.

About 60,000 were living with their mother and about 5,500 with their father. There were 921,257 living with both parents. The children were ages 6 to 18 at the start of the study, with half already in their teens.

The scientists found that children with single parents were twice as likely as the others to develop a psychiatric illness such as severe depression or schizophrenia, to kill themselves or attempt suicide, and to develop an alcohol related disease.

Girls were three times more likely to become drug addicts if they lived with a sole parent, and boys were four times more likely.

The researchers concluded that financial hardship, which they defined as renting rather than owning a home and as being on welfare, made a big difference.

However, other experts questioned the financial influence and suggested that quality of parenting could also be a factor.

"It makes you think that what you're seeing is just the most dysfunctional families having these problems, rather than the low income. The money is really an indicator of something else," said Sara McLanahan, a professor of sociology at Princeton University, who was not involved in the study.

Comment

Children need both parents when they are growing up. Society has made good progress in trying to redefine the definition of "family." God intended for a family to begin with the union of a man and a woman. Of course, there are valid reasons why a child may be living with a

single parent such as the death of the mother or father.

If God's Word were followed, there would be no children born out of wedlock!

Financial hardship should not enter into the picture. Financial hardship for some is one of the features of the society in which we live. The quality of parenting is the crucial factor in rearing a mentally sound and God fearing child. "Train up a child in the way he would go" and when he is old, he will not depart from it" (Proverbs 22:6).

Newton predicted world's end, BBC says

JERUSALEM - Sir Isaac Newton predicted the world will be ending in 57 years, based on a document from a Jerusalem archive, a TV network said. But a library official said he has not seen the document.

Newton's somber prediction was unearthed by a Canadian researcher in a British Broadcasting Corp. documentary," Newton: The Dark heretic."

In a statement promoting the program, to be aired March 1, the BBC said it will show a handwritten Newton document predicting the end in 2060, and assigns calculations he made based on the Bible. The BBC said the document was found in the Jewish National Library in Jerusalem.

Raphael Weiser, director of the library's manuscripts and archives department, said Sunday that Canadian academic Stephen Snobelen worked extensively on its Newton collection and had brought a BBC camera crew with him. Weiser said he has not seen the document the program intends to present as evidence.

Newton, who died in 1727, is renowned for formulating the law of gravity, but he also was a theologian who wrote more than a million words on biblical subjects. The BBC said he studied the Bible for more than 50 years to unravel God's secret laws of the universe.

Comment

"But of that day and hour knoweth no man, no, not the angels of heaven, but my Father only" (Matthew 24:36). Sir Isaac Newton evidently did not believe this verse.

United Islamic state called for by clerics

POLL LINKS FAITH, HAPPINESS



Despite increased tensions on the world stage and a faltering U.S. economy, nine of 10 Americans are happy with their lives and say their religious faith has a lot to do with it, according to a Barna research poll.

Those with an active Christian faith - who attend church, read the Bible and pray during a typical week - were more likely than other adults to say that they are very happy with their lives, that their faith is growing deeper and that they are in excellent physical condition.

Respondents in the "nonfaith" group were least likely to feel very happy or connected with others and most likely to feel that their lives are increasingly stressful and complex, the study says.

Nonpracticing Christians and adults affiliated with other faith groups fell between those two extremes on the happiness scale. But George Barna, who directed the study and provided an analysis, pointed out that many of the happy respondents also are the most affluent and that happiness doesn't mean that religion is being practiced properly, especially a Christian faith that puts service to God before material comforts.



Questions and Answers

Question: Why waste time emphasizing that 'eternal torment in hell' is an erroneous belief as it seems that few any longer believe in it? Why not spend the time talking about the glories and beauty of God's Word of truth?

Answer: The idea that the majority of the human race will go into a hell of torment at the time of their death is still held by millions of people! It has never been removed from the church creeds. False doctrine, or teaching, based on anything except God's Word does not die easily! Being sent to hell to be tortured in fire and brimstone is very real to many people.

No evidence has ever been presented to prove that fear of hell has raised the moral standards of any people. On the other hand, many have declared themselves aetheists rather than worship a God who permits His human creations to be so cruelly dealt with. We need to be dedicated to teaching all the true doctrines found in God's Word, untrammeled by the errors which have become part of man-made religion.

The doctrine of eternal torment is not truth. It is based on a devilish lie as the following text shows: "Now the serpent was more subtle than any beast of the field which the Lord God had made. And he said unto the woman, Yea, hath God said, Ye shall not eat of every tree of the garden? And the woman said unto the serpent, We may eat of the fruit of the trees of the garden: But of the fruit of the tree which is in the midst of the garden, God hath said, Ye shall not eat of it, neither shall ye touch it, lest ye die.

And the serpent said unto the woman, Ye shall not surely die" (Genesis 3:1-4). The lie of the serpent was in direct contrast to the true statement of the Lord God, "But of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, thou shalt not eat of it: for in the day that thou eatest thereof THOU SHALT SURELY DIE" (Genesis 2:17).

This lie "Ye shalt not surely die" is the false foundation upon which the mortality of the soul and the eternal torment errors are built.

Question: What is the "white stone" of which our Lord mentions in Revelation 2:17?

Answer: Revelation 2:17 reads, "He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit saith unto the churches; To him that overcometh will I give to eat of the hidden manna, and will give him a white stone, and in the stone a new name written, which no man knoweth saving he that receiveth it."

When Jesus said that he would give a "white stone" to whose who overcome, He used the Greek word Psefos. This particular word appears in the New Testament in only one other instance which is in Acts 26:10. In this text as translated in Wilson's Emphatic Diaglott, we have the words of the Apostle Paul saying that before his conversion he had cast his "vote" against Christians, which resulted in their being put to death. The word "vote" is here a translation of psefos.

Liddell and Scott's Greek Dictionary displays quite an array of evidence to show that the stone, or pebble, referred to by this Greek word is in reality a balloting stone used by the ancients in casting their votes. Elections and other decisions of the people, as well as decisions of the judges, were expressed by the use of their particular kind of stone, or pebble. These stones were painted white to express a favorable vote, or black to express an unfavorable decision in the situation under consideration.

The Greeks still use a method of voting like this. They have a tinbox divided into two parts, one side painted white and the other side painted black. A hole permits the voter to insert his hand into the box and drop a little ballot made of lead, about the size of a pea, either into the white side of the box or into the black side.

The Ancient meaning of this Greek word used by Jesus, in the promise of Revelation 2:17, would seem to give an added assurance to the overcomers. He is apparently saying that He will cast His vote in favor of those who faithfully follow in His steps, that He will stand as our Advocate before the Father, assuring us of immortality.

This is a precious promise in view of all the powerful and subtle enemies which are arrayed against us as children of God! Paul raises the question, "Who is he that condemneth? ..." (Romans 8:34). It really doesn't make any difference to us who may condemn. We know that as brethren in Christ, we are certain to be accused. In many instances, brethren who make this mistake of viewing each other according to the flesh would probably vote against those whose hearts are right before God. But Christ will make no mistakes. He will cast his vote, His "white stone" for us if we are faithful, electing us to joint-heirship with Himself.

Question: Is it wrong to question what we are being taught?

Answer: It would be wrong if we did not examine the Scriptures carefully in order to ascertain whether or not what we are being taught is supported by the inspired Word of God. If we did not do this, we would be shirking our responsibility before the Lord. We should appreciate those who help us to understand the Bible, but we should not accept their teachings without proving them by the inspired Word of God.

The Apostle Paul was one of the inspired servants of God. He spoke and wrote under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, but he did not expect anyone to accept his teachings without proving them by the Word of God. In connection with Paul's ministry in Berea, we read: "These

were more noble than those in Thessalonica, in that they received the word with all readiness of mind, and searched the scriptures daily, whether those things were so" (Acts 17:11). This is the only proper attitude to take if we would be truly taught by God.

Question: In the Old Testament, is the word "day" ever used to cover more than twenty four hours?

Answer: In Genesis 2:4, we read, "These are the generation of the heavens and of the earth when they were created, in the day that the Lord God made the earth and the heavens." Here, the word "day" is used to describe the whole period of creation.

In Psalm 95:7-10, we read, "For he is our God; and we are the people of his pasture, and the sheep of his hand. Today if ye will hear his voice, Harden not your heart, as in the provocation, and as in the day of temptation in the wilderness: When your fathers tempted me, proved me, and saw my work. Forty years long was I grieved with this generation, and said, It is a people that do err in their heart, and they have not known my ways!" Again, the Lord clearly applies the word "day" to the entire forty years of Israel's wanderings in the wilderness.

Psalm 110:3 reads, "Thy people shall be willing in the day of thy power, in the beauties of holiness from the womb of the morning: thou hast the dew of thy youth." This is a reference to the thousand-year kingdom of God when Christ and the saints will rule and reign over all the earth.

Question: Is there any Scripture that states that fermented wine should not be used at the Lord's Supper? **Answer:** Yes there is. In Exodus 12:20 we read, "Ye shall eat nothing leavened;...." Now some people say that eating is different from drinking. This is just justifying man's ideas again. The preceeding verse states, "Seven days shall there be no leaven found in your houses;..." Surely that statement has nothing to do with eating and drinking. This is of course part of Moses's Law and does not affect children of God today. But there must be found no leaven at the Lord's table at communion time. "Purge out therefore the old leaven, that ye may be a new lump, as ye are unleavened. For even Christ our passover is sacrificed for us: Therefore let us keep the feast, not with old leaven, neither with the leaven of malice and wickedness; but with the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth" (I Corinthians 5:7-8).


